The 2015 EAGMA Angora Goat Show will be held at the Shenandoah Valley Fiber Festival in Berryville, VA on September 26th and 27th 2015. We are happy to announce that EAGMA will be hosting the 3rd Annual American Colored Angora Goat Registry (ACAGR) National Show in 2015. ACAGR will be sponsoring some new classes for breeders to enter (check the entry forms for information). Our judge will be Sharon Chestnutt of Oregon. Inspector Training Class for ACAGR at the 2015 EAGMA Show

Come and learn how to inspect a goat in a step-by-step fashion, evaluate the entire animal including fleece and conformation and see if it meets the breed requirements. Learn how unregistered animals that meet the requirements can be registered by American Colored Angora Goat Registry (ACAGR).

This is also a wonderful chance to learn how to evaluate your herd and animals that you are looking to bring into your herd in a methodical fashion. Getting an overall view of each animal helps with making breeding

choices and managing the overall quality of your herd. Our judge, Sharon Chestnutt, will be teaching this class. She is a long time breeder of angora goats and wrote the training manual for this class. The class will be held Friday September 25th from 4 to 6pm in the Sheep Barn at SVFF. The cost is \$30, payable by check to Ms. Chestnutt at the start of the class.

In Memory: Jim McCaul Indian Springs Farm

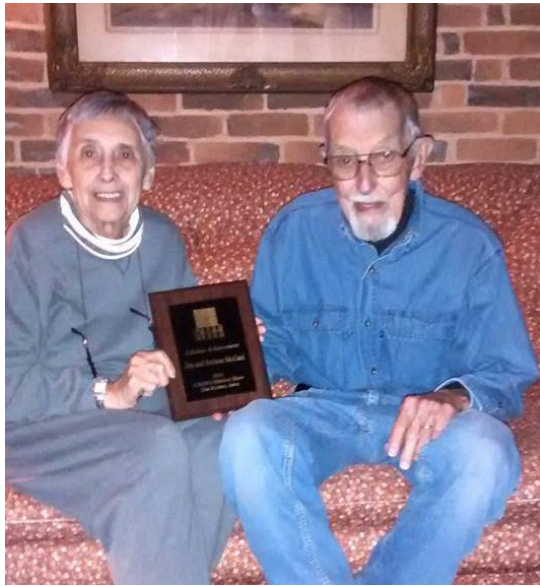
Jim McCaul, of Indian Springs Farm in Potosi MO, died on March 15, 2015 at home at the age of 85. Born on April 3, 1929, in Nashville, TN, Jim earned a degree in Civil Structural Engineering from Vanderbilt University. He served as the City of Potosi and Washington Counties Engineer, worked as a Licensed Land Surveyor, and consulted extensively for the U.S. Corps of Engineers in the Middle East.

Jim and his wife Avelene were married on November 24, 1950, and spent sixty-four years together. They moved from Chicago to Potosi in 1965, when their third son was still an infant, trading the city life for a 200-year-old farmhouse and a working farm. For the next fifty years, they rebuilt their house, raised their family, and gained a national reputation for excellent fiber production.

The McCauls' adventures in fiber animals began with few sheep that were a gift from Avelene's father. They quickly expanded their herd to 100 registered Suffolk ewes. Their interest in fibers soon led them to experiment with colored sheep, specifically Border Leicester.

Because of Jim's work in the Middle East, the McCauls' fiber production interests switched to Angora goats. In 1980, they purchased 5 white Angora does and a buck from Texas. Soon after, they acquired a colored buck and expanded their Angora herd to over forty animals.

Over the years, the McCauls earned honors and accolades for their champion goats and their generous participation in the Angora goat communities, including farm tours and goat- and fiber show judging. In the photo below, Avelene and Jim are holding their CAGBA lifetime achievement award from 2014.



Jim is survived by his wife Avelene McCaul; three sons, Dr. Jim (and Dr. Debbi) McCaul, Chris McCaul, and Alexander (and Judy) McCaul, and fifteen grandchildren. He was pre-deceased by his son Jaime and granddaughter Nicole.

**Historical Angora Goat Usage:
Weather Forecasting in the 1970s**

In the early 1970s, a roving herd of Angora goats grazed along the slopes of 1,200-foot Mount Nebo, in Roseburg, Ore., blissfully unaware they had become four-footed weather forecasters.

Local pilots and women hanging out laundry consulted the goats’ position as weather indicators. Goats high up the mountain meant dry or fair weather, grazing on the lower slopes meant rain.

National News

National: Did you ever wonder what happens to the information you submit on your USDA farm census forms? Now you can see it, illustrated. The *Washington Post* newspaper website has compiled a map of all of the goats in the United States. As the newspaper reports, “There were 2,621,514 goats in the United States as of 2012, the year of the most recent USDA Agricultural Census. If America’s goats were their own state, its population would be larger than that of Wyoming,

Vermont, D.C. and North Dakota -- combined.”

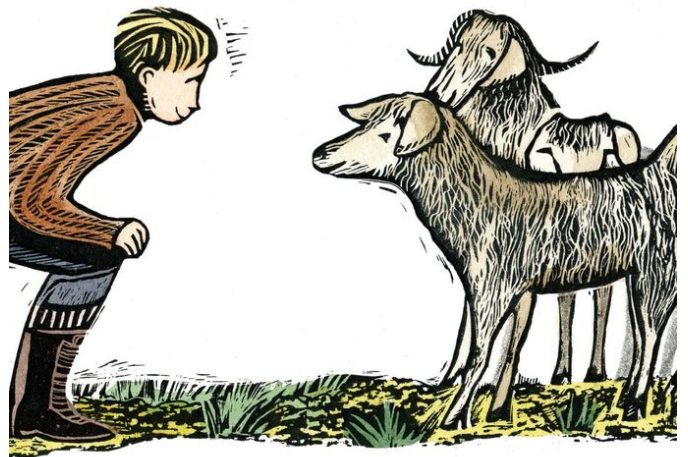

National: In 2014, Texas increased its Angora goat herd total to 85,000. In comparison, Wisconsin’s Angora goats total around 900. Nation-wide, for all goats, the population increased by 2%. Mohair production in the United States from 159,000 clipped goats and kids was 880,000 pounds, with an average of 5.5 pounds per clip. Based on an average price of \$4.85 per pound, the mohair had a value of \$4.27 million.

In 1918, artist and adventurer Rockwell Kent II left New York, bound for the last frontier with his then 9-year-old son, Rocky. The Kents settled in a small cabin on Fox Island, located 12 miles south of Seward in Resurrection Bay, that was part of a fox farm and goat ranch run by Lars Olson.

Texas: Wool production down, but mohair production up for 2014. – by Jerry Lackey “As for natural fibers, the mohair production led across the nation — approximately 90 percent produced on the Edwards Plateau — totaling 880,000 pounds last year. Angora goats and kids clipped, at 159,000 head, were up 11 percent from 2013. Average weight per fleece at 5.5 pounds, was up 2 percent from 2013. Value of mohair production was \$4.27 million, 29 percent above 2013.”

International News

Australia: “Australian mohair, produced by Angora goats, regains its mojo after decades in the doldrums” – by Tim Lee. “The finest mohair, produced from Angora goats, is used in high-end fashions and furnishings, but like other natural fibres such as wool, its use has declined in recent times at the expense of synthetics.”

Now mohair is enjoying a resurgence, and for the past two years prices paid for Australian mohair have risen steadily. Late last year at an auction in Narrandera, New South Wales, bales of the finest fleeces fetched record prices: in one instance selling for \$46.50 per kilogram.”

United Kingdom: “Goats can develop their own accents” – In 2012, a team from Queen Mary University of London studied how goat voices change when they move away from their siblings and parents to mingle with other groups. They found that a goat’s “accent” changed as it grew older and moved into different groups, disproving claims that goat voices are entirely genetic.
